A very warm welcome to all of the trainees who have recently commenced specialty training. I hope that you are settling into your new training posts and getting to grips with the many opportunities and challenges that ST3 has to offer. A warm welcome also to the 'old and bold' who continue to gather competencies in a bid to achieve consultant status!

I assumed the role of FOM Trainee Representative in March 2015 and, as this is my first opportunity to contribute to the FOM Training Newsletter, I would like to introduce myself formally to those of you I have yet to meet in person. I was an undergraduate in medicine at the University of Aberdeen when I joined the Royal Air Force in 2003. After serving a period of time as a General Duties Medical Officer, I commenced training in general practice with the Defence Deanery in 2006. I qualified as an independent practitioner in early 2009 and worked as a

GP for over 5 years. I was assigned to RAF Lyneham, RAF Linton-on-Ouse and the Royal Centre for Defence Medicine during that time, in addition to serving in the Falkland Islands and Afghanistan. Following two tours as a Senior Medical Officer, I decided that I wanted to extend my skills in occupational medicine and commenced specialty training in September 2014.

As I am sure you are aware, we are a relatively small group of fewer than 100 trainees, who come from a wide variety of clinical backgrounds, and are undertaking training within the NHS, military and industrial sectors across Scotland, England, Wales and Northern Ireland. My role as FOM Trainee Representative is to try and ensure that the needs and interests of all specialty registrars are taken into consideration in all aspects of the work of the Faculty. I therefore attend the FOM Board, Specialist Advisory sub-Committee (SAC) and Regional Specialty Advisers meetings throughout the year to provide us with an official voice.

I am, thankfully, not alone in my role as a trainee representative. The newly appointed FOM Deputy Trainee Representatives are Emma Giblin and Vicky Mason, who are undertaking a job share of the role as they are both part-time trainees. We are also joined by Abeyna Jones who is the National School of Occupational Health Trainee Representative. It is hoped that she will be joined by a second NSOH representative from industry in the near future. We are also ably assisted by Dan Ashdown who administers the Trainee Google Group.

The FOM Board are due to hold a strategy meeting next month to determine the main priorities for the Faculty in 2016. I will be in attendance and provide feedback to the trainee representatives in due course. We then hope to use this strategy as a platform to develop our own trainee objectives for the 2-3 years of our tenure. We will communicate our plans via future newsletters and, more informally, via the Trainee Google Group. I am the first to admit that I have been more of a 'lurker' rather than a more outspoken 'contributor' on the Google Group to date but, rest assured, I am listening. #### Part 2 MFOM examination revision course 2016
