GMC issues guidance on colleague and patient questionnaires for revalidation

The General Medical Council has recently produced a series of checklists for those who will be involved in commissioning, developing and administering colleague and patient questionnaires. Their new guidance can be downloaded from the GMC website at http://www.gmc-uk.org/doctors/revalidation/9575.asp. While the GMC will not be accrediting any questionnaires for the purposes of revalidation, they will expect all questionnaires to meet the criteria they have published.

Feedback from colleagues and feedback from patients (where appropriate) will be two pieces of supporting information that doctors will need to collect at least once in a revalidation cycle, preferably in the first two years. Feedback is designed to be a learning and development tool to help doctors identify their strengths and areas where they may be able to improve their practice.

GMC consults on its role in CPD

The General Medical Council is reviewing its role in relation to doctors' continuing professional development (CPD). Good Medical Practice requires doctors to keep their knowledge and skills up to date throughout their careers. Revalidation will place increasing emphasis on this. The GMC is now exploring how it can help doctors plan, carry out and evaluate CPD relevant to their practice.

As part of the review, they would like to get a snapshot of how doctors use CPD and their views on the role the GMC should play in supporting doctors' CPD activities. It has therefore launched an informal survey to support the review. You can read more about the review at:
